



School Visits to Lampport Hall

Lampport Hall is a rich resource, and a blank canvas for school visits. It was the home of the Isham family from 1560 to 1976, so our history starts with the Tudors (the Tudor period ended in 1603).

We have a wealth of art and furniture in the Hall, an impressive library, a complete family history, and a detailed architectural history as the Hall evolved from a Tudor manor to the house you see today.

The Hall is set in 10 acres of formal garden - we host outdoor theatre, music and dance events in the walled garden – and we have a small woodland, and surrounding fields.

We also run an arable farm attached to the estate, and have annual visits from schools who bring children from town into the countryside, so they can see where their food comes from.

The small village of Lampport, and the parish church, also have interesting histories of how they developed, and the people who lived and worked here.

With all these resources at our disposal, we can work with you on a specific period in history, work outside in the gardens and down on the farm – it all depends on your imagination, your particular curriculum need(s), and Health & Safety regulations.

The Hall & Gardens are open to the public on Wednesdays & Thursdays, from the beginning of April to the end of September, so school visits in spring and summer are available on Mondays and Tuesdays only. In autumn and winter we can be more flexible.

I hope you will see the potential of using Lampport Hall to enhance your pupils' learning, and look forward to having a discussion with you about what you would like to achieve from your visit and how we can create the learning experience.
